\* Forensic anesthesiologist Dr. Joel Zivot has graciously agreed to join our Advisory Board. We are grateful for all of Dr. Zivot's work examining the troubling effects of lethal injection and we look forward to working with him.

\* We thank Rep. Neil Rafferty (D-Birmingham) who sponsored HB 544 and cosponsors Reps. Rolanda Hollis (D-Birmingham), Adline Clark (D-Mobile), and Laura Hall (D-Huntsville). This bill would have ended the death penalty as a potential sentence in Alabama. We are hopeful that support for this type of legislation will continue to grow in future sessions.

\* Darrell Grayson, former PHADP chairman until his execution in 2007 had a poem published in the February edition of POETRY magazine. Advisory Board Member, Dale Wisely said "Darrell's poem can be read online. This is just a wonderful, wonderful thing!" and we couldn't agree more. \* To the news that Jefferson County Judge Tracie Todd has been temporarily removed from the bench after a 100-plus page complaint filed against her by the Judicial Inquiry Commission and is charged with multiple incidents of abuse of judicial power and abandonment of the judicial role of detachment and neutrality, we offered this quote from Attorney General Merrick Garland. "Justice should be blind but not heartless."

\* United States Court of Appeals for the 11th Circuit upheld the death sentence for Kenneth Smith, despite the fact that the jury voted 11-1 in favor of sparing his life. This practice of judicial override has been abandoned everywhere in the country. Even Alabama.

\* The U.S. Supreme Court denied Mark Jenkins's a hearing on his well documented Atkins claims. His case was highlighted in an Op-Ed in The Hill just days before the denial, stating that he was a man who should have never been on death row because of his obvious disability.

THE WORST LAW OF ALL TIME IN DEATH PENALTY CASES

The worst law of all time in death penalty cases is the law allowing defendants to be convicted on circumstantial evidence alone. Circumstantial evidence is defined as, "evidence based on inference, and not on personal knowledge or observation." (Black's Law Dictionary).

As we interpret this definition of circumstantial evidence, we come to the realization that there are people on death row today based on inferences, but we wonder how there are innocent people being sentenced to death. Well, here's your answer: Our laws have been designed to ease the burden of proof, not only in capital cases, but in non-capital cases as well. The problem with this is, in a capital case, a person may be sentenced to death despite the fact that they may be innocent of the capital offense. In this instance, someone may lose their life, when on the other hand, in a non-capital case, this individual gets to continue their fight towards proving their innocence.

As we have seen in the past years, more and more exonerations have taken place. This goes to show that there is and has been a flaw in our justice system for decades. One of the greatest flaws is this law, by far, So what do we do? We must press our lawmakers into fixing the problem.

In Alabama, all 140 members of the legislature are up for election in 2022, and will be running under new lines. This is a great opportunity for the citizens of our state to see where our lawmakers stand on change. If we are to make prosecutions more reliable in death penalty cases. We must first design some laws that will protect against wrongful convictions. To do this, "no person shall be convicted on circumstantial evidence alone." This doesn't mean that circumstantial evidence can't be used, but there has to be more when convicting someone of a capital offense. So let's come together and make our justice system better.

EVOLVING STANDARDS OF DECENCY

Support for the death penalty has been on the decline for several years. In the wake of a change of opinion by most Americans against the death penalty, many states have passed and/or proposed legislation to abolish the death penalty.

Just last month (March) four Alabama legislators (Neil Raffert-D, Birmingham, Rolanda Hollis-D, Birmingham, Adline Clarke-D, Mobile, and Laura Hall-D, Huntsville) proposed a bill to abolish the death penalty in Alabama. In past years, before his retirement, Sen. Hank Sanders proposed bills for a moratorium in the death penalty so that a study could be conducted regarding the fairness of the application of capital punishment in the state. His proposed bills never made it out of committee (200-2018).

The measure that is now being proposed signifies a recommission of the evolving standards of decency by members of the state legislative body.

This action comes in light of the abolition of the death penalty in the capitol of the old confederate state of Virginia.

However, Alabama has yet to confront the issue of the death penalty concerning juveniles who have been convicted and sentenced for capital crimes.

In Roper v. Simmons (2005), the United States Supreme Court deemed a death sentence unconstitutional for juvenile offenders 17 years of age and under.

In Graham v. Florida (2010), The United States Supreme Court deemed unconstitutional the sentence of life without parole for juvenile offenders who did not commit homicide.

In Miller v. Alabama(2012), the United States Supreme Court deemed unconstitutional the mandatory sentence of life without parole for juvenile offenders.

Recently, Washington's State Supreme Court (2021) has deemed it unconstitutional for juveniles, ages 19 and 20, to be sentenced to life without parole. The essential factors in all of the above cases is "the scientific data regarding the development of the human brain in juveniles" which diminishes their capability to understand the gravity of their conduct.

With society being more in favor of life without parole for capital offenders in general, which a large portion consist of offenders who were juveniles at the time of their crime, the death penalty, as a punishment, should be done away with all together...

Why not do away with the death penalty right now...

## The Knowledge of Death

They know not what they do, wisdom and understanding are two key components of life. Intellectual is appealing to or engaging the intellect, in some cases to a very high degree. A person with mild intellect still has the ability to rationalize the difference between right and wrong. They have the knowing when they have done something wrong, like when they have committed a crime. Most individuals even have an understanding of the process of the death penalty, the fact that all murder cases don't even carry the sentence of death. Atkins v. Virginia is a case that basically said that it is unconstitutional for states to execute individuals that meet requirements that states have allotted to show that a person is mentally incompetent to be responsible for their actions.

Intellectual disability is an incapacitation of the lack of intellect, a disadvantage that impairs or interferes with achieving understanding in a particular area. Before the United States Supreme Court stopped states from executing people with mental intellectual disabilities, numerous people were killed not even understanding what was happening to them. Some of these guys couldn't even rationalize that they actually did anything wrong. It took the United States Supreme Court to force most states to stop violating the Constitutional rights of these condemned individuals. Even after these states have allowed the criteria to meet to be too high, for instance, no state has the same IQ number you have to have in order to be declared mentally disabled. It seems like everybody should have the same number and requirements. Yet in most states, a lot of the guys with mental disabilities haven't even had their sentence overturned because the burden of proof falls on the defendant to prove that they have a mental disability. This should be an area where the defense and the state should work together so no one's Constitutional rights are violated.

I believe these states know exactly what they were doing when they allowed for these individuals to be executed. They knew they were morally in the wrong, yet they did it anyway. They knew they were running out of time, so they continued to kill people. If precedent wouldn't have been established in Atkins, people would still be getting murdered. Today, guys with clear and sometimes documented mental intellectual disabilities still sit facing execution chambers and lengthy prison sentences because these states know what they are doing!

## Pick & Choose

Cognitive Schemas - thought structures - influence what we notice and how the things we notice get interpreted.

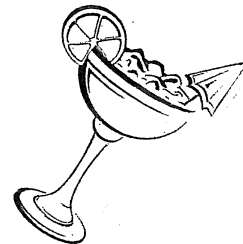
Terminology operates not only as part of conscious, rational deliberations, but also automatically - without conscious awareness or intent. Psychological opinion is the overwhelming evidence that a person can be more or less retarded based on a scientific test, showing implied bias as well as out-right bias. In other words, the fact that you may honestly believe that you are not biased against the mentally challenged does not mean that you are free from unconscious bias. Term based biases may show that you hold negative attitudes and stereotypes about the developmentally disabled, even though you do not believe you do, and do not want to. Those who are explicitly biased towards the mentally retarded tend also to have the greatest implicit bias towards them, and vice versa. Yet, there is a weak correlation between degrees of out-right and implied bias, many people who think they are not biased against the intellectually disabled prove, when tested, to have a relatively high level of bias. For example, a colleague posed a question: "Is it okay to execute someone who is intellectually disabled?" The response was an overwhelming 96%, but when asked "If it was okay to execute the mentally retarded, the response changed, people were unsure. 52% said it was wrong to execute the mentally retarded.

See how a play of words can change people's thought structures. Unfortunately, a fairly consistent finding is that punitiveness and hostility almost always increase when people are primed - even subliminally - with test data or verbal cues associated with mentally challenged Americans. In fact, studies indicate that people become unsure when the terminology changes, calling for discussion when engaging the topic; people are more lenient when different terminology is use towards the intellectually challenged.

The death penalty was psychologically sanitized with lethal injection as a "humane" means for killing American citizens. Psychologists, when changing the terminology from mentally retarded and all variations thereof, to intellectually disabled simply sanitized the vocabulary, making it easier to overlook the realities for all concerned, especially those facing the ultimate punishment--DEATH!

## Hypocrisy

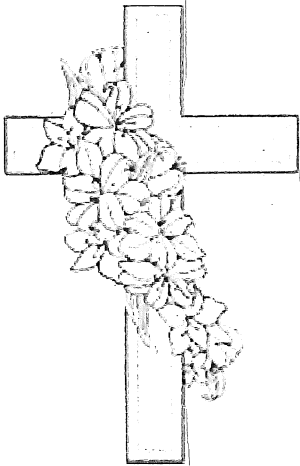
