

When The Lights Go Out Next Door: The Quiet Grief of a Man Who
Watches Another Be Executed

The night they took him, the air felt heavy - like the walls themselves were holding their breath. I didn't see his face that last time, only mentally, hearing the muffled shuffle of chains and the low murmur of voices carrying him away. A man was being led to die, and I was in spirit - close enough to hear the footsteps fade.

There's a kind of hurt that words can't quite hold - the pain of knowing another life ends, not by accident, not by illness, but by deliberate hands. The state calls it justice. The world moves on. But for the ones who were near, who shared space and silence with Ant, it's something different. It's a hollow ache that lingers in the air long after the cell door closes again.

He was my brother, he was my friend. But in person, proximity is a strange kind of intimacy. You learn each other's rhythms when he coughs, when he laughs, when he prays. I hear the strength in his voice when he talks to family, reassuring the hope when he talks about appeals. I start to root for him, quietly, even when you know how things usually end.

Then the day comes. The whispers spread through the tier. Some guys turn away, some curse, some cry. And when it's over, it's not just his death that hurts - it's the reminder of my own fragility, my own humanity. I realize how thin the line is between one cell and the next, between life and death, guilt and grace.

The system doesn't account for the ones left behind. It doesn't measure the damage done to the witnesses of death - those who remain to hear the silence that follows. That silence is not peaceful. It's haunting. It asks questions I can't answer.

What does it mean to be human in a place designed to strip one of feelings? How do I mourn someone the world has decided doesn't deserve to be mourned?

I sit on my bunk, the lights dim overhead, and feel a crack in my chest that no sentence or time can heal. The hurt doesn't fade. It just settles, deep and quiet, like dust over cold concrete.

And every time the air grows still (like now), I remember - my brother lived here, and then he didn't.


- Holi(DAYS) -



Who is the monster?

Alabama's latest execution, on October 23, was the longest execution by nitrogen gas in history. It took 37 minutes for prison guards to kill Anthony "Ant" Boyd, during which time he convulsed on the gurney and gasped for air over 225 times.

But he was a murderer, you say.

Not so fast. Boyd maintained his innocence from Day One in a case with no physical evidence against him whatsoever. Prosecutors never claimed that Boyd was the killer. They claimed he was an accomplice to the crime based on a co-defendant who testified against Boyd to save his own skin—a common cause of wrongful convictions.

The possibility that Alabama tortured a man who was actually innocent looms large in this case. Over the last 50 years, there have been just over 200 exonerations from death row, and just over 1600 executions. That's right—for every eight executions in this country, one person was convicted and sentenced to death in a case where we admit we got it wrong. That's a terrible statistic by any measure.

But for argument's sake, let's say that Boyd was in fact guilty. If so, he was an accomplice to a murder over 30 years ago. Are you the same person you were 30 years ago? Me either.

This is one of the more surprising finds from my deep dive into executions over the past seven years. My research has offered—insisted upon, even—a front-row seat as to who these people are at the end. Not who they were at the time of their crime. Not who they were at the time of their trial. But who they are 10, 20, 30 years later.

It takes decades for a death sentence to ripen into an execution—and it *should*. Aside from all those death row exonerations, somewhere between half to two-thirds of all death sentences are overturned on appeal. In Alabama, that reversal rate has translated to at least 107 death sentences reversed as of 2020, resulting in either a reduced sentence or exoneration. That's 107 cases where death was not deserved, and maybe not even the conviction.

Importantly, the top two reasons for death row reversals nationally are prosecutorial misconduct and grossly ineffective assistance of counsel. Those are not mere technicalities. If we're going to have a death penalty, we can't have sleeping lawyers or drunk lawyers or plainly incompetent lawyers. We can't have prosecutors hiding exculpatory evidence. If we're going to kill somebody for a crime, we better get it right. As Justice Breyer was fond of saying, we can have a fair death penalty or a fast death penalty. We cannot have both.

So if we are to have a death penalty at all, it will take time. And this has serious implications for who we are executing. In our mind's eye, we tend to freeze these people in a single moment in time. But time works changes, and studying executions has been a potent reminder that humans have the greatest capacity to change of all. For the majority of prisoners we have executed in this country, it was evident that the person who committed that terrible crime just wasn't there anymore.

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
Now, one might respond, 'well then let's speed up those executions-we should execute people faster, before they are redeemed. But that's a mighty strange position for Christians to take. That whole redemption thing that Christians profess to believe in-I'm here to tell you that's real.

If Anthony Boyd was in fact a killer-or at least the co-conspirator of a killer-that is not the Anthony Boyd who Alabama tortured to death this week. That Anthony Boyd died inside years ago. The man that Alabama tortured to death was one of the most beloved members of the prison community, a man known to be kind and generous. This man was the chair of Project Hope to Abolish the Death Penalty, the abolition movement of Alabama.

And Ivey, tell me that executions are for the victim. The death penalty is terrible for victims-you know it as well as I do-and you lost any pretense of moral high ground when you executed Geoffrey West a few weeks ago, even though the victim's son, Will Berry, begged you not to. Berry said he loved something more than vengeance-the love and light of his savior, who called for him to forgive-and he said he needed his mother's killer alive so that he could work through that process of forgiveness. You didn't even notify him that an execution date had been set. If his wife had not found it on Facebook, he never would have known. The death penalty is not about victims, and it is surely not about living out our faith. It is about the politics of vengeance, pure and simple

On Thursday, Alabama committed a heinous act, a monstrous act, and it did so in its citizens' name. So, who is the actual monster?

Corinna Barrett Lain is the George E. Allen Chair in Law at the University of Richmond School of Law. She is one of the nation's leading authorities on the death penalty and author of *Secrets of the Killing State: The Untold Story of Lethal Injection*. Lain is a former prosecutor, former sergeant in the Army, and an elected member of the American Law Institute.

Criminal Justice

I recently watched a talk given by, then, California State Attorney General Kamala Harris. She spoke about the criminal justice system and highlighted the importance of shifting from a tough/weak on crime perspective to a smart on crime perspective. Her idea and suggestion got me thinking....

The concept of being tough on crime is like pulling weeds. You remove one person from society, with no intention of correcting or rehabilitating them, for committing a crime and two more spring up to take their place. The tough on crime policy is doing nothing but perpetuating the revolving doors of people who are being victimized by a system ran by elected officials who are not (as Governor Kay Ivey says) in the business of correcting or rehabilitating their own people... despite the name "Department of Corrections." But, of course, calling it what it really is, the Department of Punishment and Revenge, probably wouldn't sit too well with people. It's the exact same reason they adopted the name "Capital Punishment" in place of the name "lynching." They are the exact same thing in principle and practice, just with a prettier name.

Now, by no means am I suggesting that the solution is to be weak on crime. Obviously, the solution is not to simply let people run around committing crimes or slapping them on the han for serious offenses. That would be absurd... just as absurd as locking people up for committing crimes without taking any steps to educate, correct, or rehabilitate them.

The tough on crime concept is flawed because it is reactionary and history, as well as statistical data, has proven its ineffectiveness in stopping or preventing crime. The generally accepted definition of the word insanity is doing the same thing over again and expecting a different result, which means that a tough on crime criminal justice system is insane. So, what should we do?

Well, I believe Mrs. Harris was on to something when she suggested that we, as a society, need to be SMART on crime. It would be SMART to educate our children on the laws that govern the society that they will one day inherit from us. It would be SMART to educate people convicted of crimes on the laws and consequences of violating them. It would be SMART to rehabilitate them and offer job training and career opportunities upon release. And, it would be SMART to understand how people convicted of crimes got to that point to begin with.

Perpetrators are people who were victims of people who had been victimized themselves. Now, the criminal justice system is victimizing the perpetrators/victims. It's an endless cycle of pain and suffering for the entire community, the country, and the world at large. We can't expect the victimized people who have committed crimes to stand up and end this cycle. We have to rely on the criminal justice system, and the elected officials that run it, to lead by example, then lend a hand to the people within the system. And, we have to rely on each other to put officials in office that share that same vision and goal... That is Criminal Justice.

A VOICE FROM THE PAST, OUR PAST!

A Light That Never Went Out: Remembering Wallace Norrell Thomas

Execution Date: July 13, 1990. It has been nearly 35 years since my friend, Wallace Norrell Thomas, was executed by the State of Alabama. I am writing this post because I will never stop believing in his innocence.

Wallace was an exceptional person. He was a bright, intelligent HBCU student and the President of his fraternity. He proclaimed his innocence until his last breath, but the deck was always stacked against him.

Watching the trials today, with the evidence of manipulated testimony, it brings back the chilling truth of what Wallace once told me: he had no chance. His case involved a young white female victim from an affluent family with ties to the Governor—a scenario that, unfortunately, seems all too familiar in the history of capital punishment.

The Man Who Saved My Life

The world remembers him for a conviction. I remember him as the man who saved my life.

I was a troubled teen, struggling with severe suicidal ideation and two failed attempts. Wallace and I became pen pals for years, from my teens into my early adult life. Through his thoughtful, encouraging letters—all tragically destroyed by my family while I was in the Peace Corps—he guided me back to hope. He was a lifeline of wisdom and kindness. I am alive today because of Wallace Norrell Thomas. His intelligence and compassion gave me a future.

His Enduring Legacy

Though he accepted his fate, Wallace never stopped fighting for justice for others. His conviction led him to co-found a remarkable organization that is still active today:

Project Hope to Abolish the Death Penalty (PHADP): Founded in May 1989, PHADP is an organization run by death row prisoners and advocates who work to educate the public and bring about the abolition of the death penalty in Alabama. This is the work of a truly dedicated and intelligent man.

There are countless innocent men and women behind bars who are forgotten. Wallace Norrell Thomas is not one of them. By supporting the cause he dedicated his last years to, we honor his memory.
